



AMBER Alert



1.0 Utah AMBER Alert (UAA and UAAM)

The AMBER Alert is part of the nationwide AMBER Plan, a voluntary partnership between law-enforcement agencies and broadcasters. The plan utilizes the Emergency Alert System (EAS), the Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA), and other means to notify the public about a missing child and a suspected abductor. The child abduction alert was originally called the Rachael Alert in Utah.

Utah was the 5th state to adopt a statewide AMBER Plan on April 2, 2002, when Utah launched a statewide program originally called the Rachael Alert. Rachael Marie Runyan was a three-year-old girl who was kidnapped on August 26, 1982 while she was playing with her two brothers at a park in Sunset, Utah. Rachael's body was found 24 days later in Weber Canyon. Her abduction and brutal murder remain unsolved. One year after the Rachael Alert was launched in Utah, the state changed it to the AMBER Alert to avoid any public confusion. A Rachael Runyan Award was created to honor Utah citizens who help in the recovery of an abducted child. Rachael's mother, Elaine Runyan-Simmons, continues to remain actively involved in missing children and an advocate for Utah's AMBER Alert.

The Utah AMBER Alert Plan is administered by the Department of Public Safety (DPS) through the Utah Bureau of Criminal Identification (BCI). **It is mandatory that the BCI UCJIS Help Desk AMBER Alert Desk is contacted at 801-503-5566 prior to issuing an alert.**

Utah's AMBER Alert Plan is considered one of the best in the United States. Utah is the only state that does not require an agency to get approval from a designated person or main entity to issue an AMBER Alert.

The plan has been expanded in Utah to include electronic roadway signs, cell phones, and email as methods to alert the public. It has proven to be an effective way to quickly inform the public about serious child abduction cases. The goal is to instantly activate the entire community to assist in the search for and safe return of abducted children. If the suspect or person of interest in a child abduction is believed to have traveled out of Utah, law enforcement should contact BCI CIC Help Desk at 801-965-4446 and request them to issue a Nlets AMBER Alert to the surrounding states or nationwide.

1.1 Criteria for Activating a Utah AMBER Alert

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children strongly encourages every law enforcement agency to have an established protocol for investigating missing/abducted child cases. Only by developing effective and efficient policies and procedures can agencies help ensure the successful resolution of these cases.

Utah law enforcement agencies must consider ALL four of the criteria noted below before sending out an AMBER Alert:

- Law Enforcement believes a child or children have been abducted
- The child or children are 17 years old or younger
- Law Enforcement believes the victim(s) face imminent danger, serious bodily injury or death
- There is information that could assist the public in the safe recovery of the victim or apprehension of a suspect

If the criterion does not fit the AMBER Alert requirements, then the agency can consider the criteria for issuing an Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA).

1.2 Agency Procedures for issuing a Utah AMBER Alert

AMBER Alerts are issued by law enforcement agencies. Law enforcement agencies:

- Should have an established protocol to govern their use of the Amber Alert Plan within the agency's child recovery plan.
- Train all law enforcement personnel for their agency on the AMBER Alert criteria and notification process.
- Agree to designate correct personnel who have the authority to issue the AMBER Alert.
- Agree to abide by the established criteria and activation procedure and all other components of the plan.
- Agree to meet the AMBER Alert Advisory Committee to go over the timeline and answer any questions within three weeks following an AMBER Alert.

Prior to the need to issue an alert, the agency must have access in UCJIS to the Utah AMBER Alert (UAA) and AMBER Alert Modify (UAAM) transactions. Every user at an agency with access to UAA and UAAM must be trained on the proper usage of these transactions.

When the criteria have been met, the **agency administration or administrator in charge** must give approval for activation of the AMBER Alert.

The issuing agency must contact the BCI AMBER Alert Desk at 801-503-5566 prior to issuing an AMBER alert.

The issuing agency may then enter the information themselves into UCJIS or contact the dispatch center, communications center or records department to enter the AMBER Alert information into

the UCJIS system using the UAA transaction. For agencies that utilize a communications center after hours, they will be the entering entity for activation.

Once an AMBER alert is transmitted, the only way to stop the process is to CANCEL the alert. Because of the sensitive nature and urgency of a child abduction, as soon as the alert is entered into UCJIS, the information is immediately communicated to all law enforcement, the media, and the public. Therefore, no law enforcement sensitive information should be added to the alert such as social security numbers, exact physical addresses, sexual orientation, or driver license number.

When the entry is finished and submitted the alert is automatically transmitted to all law enforcement throughout the state of Utah, all media personnel, and private citizens via text messages on cell phones and email accounts. The Traffic Operations Center will then activate all overhead signs on the freeways.

The AMBER Alert will not be activated with the EAS system until it has been issued by the UCJIS entry. The issuing agency is responsible to enter, modify, and cancel their AMBER Alert through UCJIS.

Because the AMBER Alert is a broadcast message through UCJIS, the AMBER Alert can be modified with updated information and cancelled through UCJIS with the UAAM transaction. The agency that entered the AMBER alert must also cancel the alert. BCI strongly suggests all agencies have a protocol in place for AMBER Alert activation.

The impact an AMBER Alert has on the issuing agency along with the media and public interests that follows the alert may be overwhelming for an agency. Media will respond immediately to activation. If the agency has a Public Information Officer, they will need to be a part of the protocol. BCI encourages law enforcement agencies or dispatch center to keep a timeline of telephone calls and information regarding the alert to be provided at shift changes and at the AMBER Alert review after the alert has been cancelled.

1.3 Utah AMBER Alert Form

BCI has created an “AMBER Alert Field Use Form” which agencies can use to gather and organize the information they have before running the UAA transaction. **DO NOT SEND THIS FORM TO BCI.** This form is meant for agency use only. Fill out the form with all the information the agency has. Refer to this form while filling out the UAA fields. The form is found on the following two pages and is suitable for printing and copying.




1.4 Activating a Utah AMBER Alert in UCJIS (UAA)

The Utah AMBER Alert transactions, UAA and UAAM, can be accessed from the tree of UCJIS transactions or by entering the transaction codes (UAA, UAAM) into the transaction code box:

1.4.1 Authorization Section



Before you are able to enter an AMBER Alert, there will be a notice that states there is a blackout start/end time frame.

It is noted on the pop-up notice and the screen itself.

The left is a screenshot of the pop-up notice and below is from the screen.



Agency phone number should be a number the media and public can contact.

Authorizing Administrator is the person responsible for authorizing the alert.

Read and answer each question carefully and confirm the information meets the criteria and is accurate. The default is set to NO.

1.4.2 Abduction Information Section

DATE AND TIME should be the exact time of the abduction.

ABDUCTION LOCATION should NOT be the exact location but a general location or in the vicinity of. Remember to put in the name of the city.

NCIC is not mandatory, but the child should already be entered into NCIC Missing Person using AA for AMBER Alert in the MNP field.

CAUTION would pertain to the suspect or the person of interest.

IMAGE LOCATION is an option.

CLOTHING and MEDICAL NEEDS are very important to enter. Enter as much information is available.

Up to nine victims can be entered, click on the  and this section will repeat for all additional victim's information.

1.4.6 Remarks section

REMARKS is to be used for any pertinent information not entered in the previous sections. Remember to enter the issuing agency name.

Review the entry to confirm the information is correct and meets the criteria for a Utah AMBER Alert. Once the SUBMIT button is selected, **it cannot be stopped**. It can only be cancelled. The AMBER Alert is sent to all Utah law enforcement, the Emergency Alert System (EAS), the Wireless Emergency Alert system (WEA), and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC). UCJIS will respond with a window indicating the AMBER Alert has been submitted.


1.4.7 Submitting the information activates the AMBER Alert

- Suspect or person of interest
- Victim
- Remarks

1.4.8 Modifying an active AMBER Alert (UAAM)

After the initial AMBER Alert is activated and more information has become available, the new information is added to the alert through the Utah AMBER Alert Modify (UAAM) transaction code. Enter UAAM, then select the alert from the results list.







1.4.9 Canceling an active AMBER Alert (UAAM)


The only agency that can cancel an AMBER Alert is the issuing agency. The UAAM transaction is used. First enter that the alert has been cancelled by the issuing agency.

If you have difficulty cancelling the AMBER Alert by either receiving an Error Message or not receiving the confirmation, contact BCI CIC Help Desk immediately and ask them to force a cancellation. If possible, take a screen shot of the error that can be emailed to BCI at dpsscic@utah.gov.



Endangered Missing Advisory



2.0 Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA)

The EMA is to be used for endangered or missing persons that do not meet the AMBER Alert criteria. The endangered or missing person can be of any age with urgent needs. This advisory cannot be over used. Law enforcement sensitive information can be added to the detail because the EMA is issued through UCJIS as a broadcast message.

The Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA) is a voluntary partnership between law enforcement and local broadcasters to rapidly disseminate information about a missing and endangered person to Utah law enforcement agencies, news media, and the public. This is an alternative solution to situations that do not meet the AMBER Alert criteria.

The Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA) is a Utah statewide advisory only. If it is believed the person has traveled outside of Utah, please issue an AM message through Nlets.

2.1 Guidelines for an EMA

The EMA is initiated solely by Utah law enforcement agencies using the following guidelines:


- Do the circumstances fail to meet the criteria for an AMBER Alert?
- Is the person missing under unexplained, involuntary, or suspicious circumstances?
- Is the person believed to be in danger for any of the following?
 - Age
 - Health
 - Mental disability such as Autism or Alzheimer's
 - Environment
 - Weather conditions
 - In the company of a potentially dangerous person
 - Any other factor that may put the person in peril such as:
Internet enticed, Missing college student, and Overdue hikers or travelers

2.2 Agency procedures for initiating an EMA

If the guidelines have been met, the agency who is issuing an EMA contacts the UCJIS Help Desk at 801-965-4446 to let them know that an EMA is being issued or cancelled. The UCJIS Help Desk will send an email to all media. All law enforcement sensitive information is removed from the email prior to being sent to the media such as driver's license number, social security number, home address, home phone number, or sexual preference. The media then decides what to do with the information once received. If the UCJIS Help Desk is not contacted, the EMA will only go out to law enforcement.

The EMA transaction through UCJIS is one type of Broadcast Message (BC) and will be sent to all law enforcement within Utah. BCI suggests that a Public Information Officer (PIO) from the agency be appointed to handle the press.



2.4 Entering an EMA



DESTINATION: choose ALLLAW for all Utah law enforcement.

MESSAGE: Begin with ENDANGERED MISSING ADVISORY. Then add all of the information on the person along with sensitive law enforcement material if desired. Add all identifiers such as clothing, jewelry, vehicle, home address and phone. Remember to end with a law enforcement name and contact number.

2.5 When an EMA is submitted through UCJIS

When an EMA is submitted through UCJIS, the following will happen:

- UCJIS Help Desk will send out an email to the Media without sensitive information
- The Media will receive an email and will choose if they broadcast the advisory
- No freeway signs will be activated by the Traffic Operations Center (TOC) unless warranted
- No email or cell phones will be activated
- All Utah law enforcement agencies will receive a broadcast message (BC)

2.6 Canceling an EMA

When there is no longer the need for the EMA, the issuing agency is responsible for cancelling the advisory.

To cancel an EMA, use the same transaction code that was used to create the EMA.



Remember, in DESTINATIONS to send it to ALLLAW.

In MESSAGES, please enter CANCEL THE ENDANGERED MISSING ADVISORY in the first line of the message along with the name of the endangered missing person and the name of your agency.

It is very important that when the EMA is cancelled the issuing agency contact the BCI CIC Help Desk and let them know that the EMA was cancelled.

Blue Alert: Law Enforcement Assaulted, Injured, or Killed



3.0 Blue Alert (EBA)

The Blue Alert Foundation, Inc., developed the BLUE ALERT system to help law enforcement with the means to speed the apprehension of violent criminals who kill or seriously injure local, state, or federal law enforcement officers.

Based upon the success of the AMBER and Silver Alerts and using the same notification system, Concerns of Police Survivors asked law enforcement officers, agencies, and survivors to help put the “Blue Alert” into effect nationwide. Utah was the 11th state to implement the Blue Alert on October, 17, 2011.

The Blue Alert is a cooperative effort between the Department of Public Safety, Department of Transportation, the Division of Emergency Management, broadcasters, law enforcement agencies, and the general public. Using media broadcasts and Department of Transportation messaging signs, each Blue Alert covers the state with information identifying a detailed description of the offender, the offender’s vehicle, and license plate information which will inevitably hinder the violator’s ability to flee the state. The Blue Alert facilitates a speedy capture of criminals that pose a threat on other communities and law enforcement personnel.

The term BLUE ALERT means information sent through the network relating to:

- the serious injury or death of a law enforcement officer in the line of duty or
- an officer who is missing in connection with the officer’s official duties or
- an imminent and credible threat that an individual intends to cause the serious injury or death of a law enforcement officer

Utah’s definition of injured or assaulted comes from Utah Criminal Code 76-1-601: (11) “Serious bodily injury” means bodily injury that creates or caused serious permanent disfigurement, protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ, or creates a substantial risk of death. OR


(12) “Substantial bodily injury” means bodily injury, not amounting to serious bodily injury, that creates or causes protracted physical pain, temporary disfigurement, or temporary loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

The Blue Alert (EBA) is a Utah statewide alert only. If it is believed that the suspect is leaving Utah, please issue an AM message through Nlets.

3.1 Agency procedure for issuing a Blue Alert

It is imperative that the agency administer approves the alert before it is entered into UCJIS. The issuing agency must contact the UCJIS Help Desk at 801-965-4446 to inform them that a Blue Alert is being issued.

3.3 Entering an EBA

DESTINATION: choose ALLLAW for statewide law enforcement agencies.

MESSAGE: After the BLUE ALERT title, add all information that will assist law enforcement in apprehending the suspect.

Remember to enter the issuing agency name and contact number.

3.4 When a Blue Alert is submitted through UCJIS

When a Blue Alert is submitted through UCJIS, the following will happen:

- UCJIS Help Desk must be contacted and will email the Media
- The Media who requested notification will broadcast the message
- The Traffic Operations Control (TOC) may activate the freeway signs if warranted
- All Utah law enforcement agencies will receive a New Broadcast Message

To view the Blue Alert Broadcast message, it is the same procedure as viewing an EMA message.

3.5 Cancelling a Blue Alert

The issuing agency must cancel their Blue Alert and contact the UCJIS Help Desk.

Remember to send it to ALLLAW.


In MESSAGES, please enter CANCEL BLUE ALERT in the title and an identifying statement about this specific Blue Alert.

To view the cancelled Blue Alerts, select the New Broadcast Message button on the home page or use the BMSG transaction code. Enter the information requested and the results list will appear.

4.0 Silver Alert

House Bill 215 created a Silver Alert Notification System for missing endangered adults. The Silver Alert went live in May 2019. This bill defines “endangered adult” as a person 60 years of age or older with dementia. It requires the Department of Public Safety to develop an alert system similar to the Amber Alert System for endangered adults, requires that the system utilize highway signage in the geographical area where the person went missing, and allows the department to make rules to set requirements for alerts.

Utah’s definition of endangered adult and dementia comes from Utah Criminal Code 53-10-702

(1) “Dementia” means a person has a form of cognitive decline that significantly affects the person’s ability to make decisions and provide for health, safety, or self-care. This term includes Alzheimer’s disease and other forms of dementia marked by the continual loss of memory and awareness of surroundings.

(2) “Endangered adult” means a person 60 years of age or older or a person under 60 years of age who has a form of dementia.

Criteria for a Silver Alert:

- Anyone over the age of 60
- Individuals with dementia or Alzheimer’s of any age

The Silver Alert is mandatory if the circumstances meet the criteria listed in the bill. The Traffic Operating Center will light up signage in the area where the individual was last seen. If the law enforcement agency feels more signage is necessary they can request that by calling the UCJIS Help Desk.

4.3 When a Silver Alert is submitted through UCJIS

When a Silver Alert is submitted through UCJIS, the following will happen:

- The Help Desk must be contact so they can contact The Traffic Operations Control (TOC) and the media
- The TOC will activate signs in the geographical area where the person went missing
- If the law enforcement agency feels a bigger area need to have, the law enforcement agency may contact the UCJIS Help Desk to make that request
