Utah has four types of public safety alerts available and at the disposal of law enforcement to assist in safe location and recovery of missing individuals.

- Utah AMBER Alert (America's Missing Broadcast Emergency Response)
- Endangered Missing Advisory Alert (EMA)
- Silver Alert
- Blue Alert







Criteria for Missing Person

- Law Enforcement agency must have a missing person report on file to support a missing person entry, or alert.
- Missing person should be entered into the national database (NCIC) as soon as possible.








AMBER Alert

The Utah AMBER Alert is part of the nationwide AMBER Alert Plan. It is a voluntary partnership between law-enforcement agencies and broadcasters. It utilizes electronic roadway signs, cell phones, and email as methods to alert the public about a missing child and a suspected abductor.

The goal is to instantly activate the entire community to assist in the search for and safe return of abducted children.







AMBER Alert: Background

- Utah adopted the AMBER Alert plan in April 2002.
 - Originally known as the Rachael Alert for Rachael Marie Runyan.
 - Name changed to match national name in 2003.
- First Rachael Alert was issued June 5, 2002.
 - Elizabeth Smart.
- Utah was the 5th state to adopt a statewide plan.
- To date, Utah has issued 77 AMBER alerts for 96 kids.







What determines an AMBER Alert?

Law enforcement has to consider ALL four items listed in the AMBER Alert criteria before sending out an AMBER Alert.

If the criteria does not fit the AMBER Alert requirements, then the agency can consider issuing an Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA).

Criteria

- Law Enforcement believes a child or children have been abducted
- The child or children are 17 years old or younger
- Law Enforcement believes the victim(s) face imminent danger of serious bodily injury or death
- There is information that could assist the public in the safe recovery of the victim or apprehension of a suspect





Procedure

Alerts can be activated anytime of the day or night and will include information on the child, as well as the suspect/person of interest, and/or vehicle.

All this information is shared with the media and the public all with the sole purpose of locating the missing child as soon as possible.

If during the investigation, the agency discovers the suspect might be traveling out of state, BCI has the ability to transmit the alert to surrounding states, or nationwide. If needed, the Utah AMBER Alert coordinators may also reach out to other states and request that they activate an AMBER Alert on our behalf.

AMBER Alert can be changed or modified anytime new information comes in.






Methods of Notification


Utah BCI automatically activates the following notification methods to alert the public:




Endangered Missing Advisory (EMA)

The Endangered Missing Advisory Alert is to be used for endangered or missing persons of any age with urgent needs.

It is also a voluntary partnership between law enforcement and local broadcasters to rapidly disseminate information to all of Utah law enforcement agencies, news media, and the public.

This is an alternative solution to situations that do not meet the AMBER Alert criteria.







Are there guidelines for an EMA?

The EMA is initiated solely by Utah law enforcement agencies using the following guidelines:

- For juveniles, do the circumstances fail to meet the criteria for an AMBER Alert?
- Is the person missing under unexplained, involuntary, or suspicious circumstances?
- Is the person believed to be in danger?



- Age
- Health
- Environment
- Mental disability
- Weather conditions
- In the company of a potentially dangerous person
- Any other factor that may put the person in peril such as: Internet enticed, missing college student, and overdue hikers or travelers





Procedure

Once the guidelines have been met, the agency who is issuing an EMA contacts BCI at the UCJIS Help Desk to let them know that an EMA is being issued (or cancelled).

After removing all sensitive information, the UCJIS Help Desk will send an email to all media. The media then decide if they want to broadcast the information.

If the agency feels, they can appoint a Public Information Officer (PIO) to handle the press, and release further information if needed.





Methods of Notification

- Different from the AMBER Alert, the only automatic notification will be to all law enforcement.
 - The UCJIS Help Desk sends an email notification to the media with law enforcement sensitive information removed.
 - No freeway signs will be activated by the Traffic Operations Center (TOC) unless warranted.
 - No email or cell phones will be activated.





Silver Alert

Utah's Silver Alert went live in May 2019, and is an alert notification for missing endangered adults 60 years of age or older and/or individuals of any age with Dementia or Alzheimer's.

The Silver Alert is mandatory if the circumstances meet the criteria.







Silver Alert Guidelines

- Anyone over the age of 60.
- Individuals of any age with Dementia or Alzheimer's.
 - This includes Autistic individuals of any age.

Utah's definition of endangered adult and dementia

- (1) "Dementia" means a person has a form of cognitive decline that significantly affects the person's ability to make decisions and provide for health, safety, or self-care. This term includes Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia marked by the continual loss of memory and awareness of surroundings.
- (2) "Endangered adult" means a person 60 years of age or older or a person under 60 years of age who has a form of dementia.





Procedure

Once the guidelines have been met, the agency who is issuing the Silver Alert should contact BCI at the UCJIS Help Desk to let them know that the alert is being issued (or cancelled).

After entering the information in UCJIS, an email will be sent to the media by the help desk. The media then decides if they want to broadcast the information.

The BCI's Silver Alert webpage will show any active Silver Alerts.





Methods of Notification

- The TOC will activate signs in the geographical area where the person went missing.
 - If law enforcement agency determines a larger geographical area should be alerted, the law enforcement agency may contact the Help Desk to make that request.






Blue Alert

The BLUE Alert system is to help law enforcement with the means to speed the apprehension of violent criminals who kill or seriously injure local, state, or federal law enforcement officers.

The Blue Alert facilitates a speedy capture of criminals that pose a threat to the community and law enforcement personnel.

Using media broadcasts and Department of Transportation messaging signs, each Blue Alert covers the state with information identifying a detailed description of the offender, the offender's vehicle, and license plate information which will inevitably hinder the violator's ability to flee the state.







Blue Alert Guidelines

The term BLUE ALERT means information sent through the network relating to:

- The serious injury or death of a law enforcement officer in the line of duty or,
- An officer who is missing in connection with the officer's official duties or,
- An imminent and credible threat that an individual intends to cause the serious injury or death of a law enforcement officer.





Utah's definition of injured or assaulted

"Serious bodily injury" means bodily injury that creates or caused serious permanent disfigurement, protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ, or creates a substantial risk of death.

OR (12) "Substantial bodily injury" means bodily injury, not amounting to serious bodily injury, that creates or causes protracted physical pain, temporary disfigurement, or temporary loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

Blue Alert Criteria

- Law enforcement officer killed, injured, or assaulted.
- Imminent threat to public.
- Information available for the public.
- Will dissemination of information help avert further harm?
- Agency administrator must approve the alert.





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OR (12) "Substantial bodily injury" means bodily injury, not amounting to serious bodily injury, that creates or causes protracted physical pain, temporary disfigurement, or temporary loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

Procedure

The issuing agency must contact the UCJIS Help Desk to inform them that a Blue Alert is being issued.

The Media who requested notification will broadcast the message.

The Traffic Operations Control (TOC) may activate the freeway signs if warranted.


All Utah law enforcement agencies will receive a new Broadcast Message with the alert's information.





Quick Reminder: For a missing person to be listed on the BCI Website, a Missing Person Waiver must be submitted to BCI by the agency or a family member.

- Waiver can be submitted in person or by email.
- The agency case number must be included, along with the victim's photo.





Quick Reminders:

- A cancelation has to be submitted for ALL ALERTS after the missing child/person has been located, whether they are found safe or not.
 - Recently we noticed that there are at least 5 Endangered Missing Alerts (EMA's) for which we never received a cancelation notice and the subjects were located safely.
- Modifications are only to be submitted if there are changes or updates that need to be made on the alerts (AMBER and Silver).
 - o If missing person is located, alert must be canceled, and not modified.
- The UCJIS Help Desk must be notified prior to issuance of an alert is issued, and should be contacted when an alert is canceled.


